

On the Bear Trail: Gorge of the Große Kamp

The Waldviertel – a walker's paradise

The Waldviertel has a dense network of well-marked trails which, step-by-step, offer you an intensive nature experience. It is not for nothing that four of Austria's many long-distance trails cross the region. The Bear Trail (Bärentrail) is a network of trails where you can experience the Waldviertel's highlights in their purest form: granite rock, cool forests, pristine streams, ancient villages.

The Bear Trail benefits in many ways from its location on the Waldviertel plateau. Here you can cool off in hot summers. In foggy autumn weeks, with some luck, you can smile down from 700-900 metres on the clouds blanketing the valleys. The rolling landscape offers you endless options.





The Bear Trail is a walking trail, not a mountain bike route. Every Bear Trail (Great, Small and Teddy) takes you along a defined route marked with a bear's paw in ONE direction.

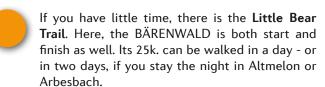
Beartrail walkers love nature and animals. Please keep to the trails, don't leave the marked route. Heed signs like 'Privatgrund' (Private) and 'Achtung Weidevieh! Hunde an die Leine' (Grazing cattle! Keep your dog on leash). Never leave litter in the forest and don't make noise. Thank you.



Around the BÄRENWALD bear sanctuary at Arbesbach you'll discover unique natural treasures: moss-covered granite rocks, waterfalls hidden under huge boulders, placid forest streams, fragrant forests. And unspoiled countryside, peace and quiet in abundance.

To acquaint a wider public with these natural beauties embedded in a picturesque landscape created by human hands over centuries, the BÄRENWALD Arbesbach, a project of the animal welfare NGO VIER PFOTEN, and the municipalities Altmelon, Arbesbach, Groß Gerungs and Rappottenstein jointly created the Bear Trail.

The Great Bear Trail starts and ends at the BÄRENWALD Arbesbach bear sanctuary. You can get there by car or bus. Take ample time for the 6 stages (4, 5 or 6 days, depending on your fitness level). The indicated hours refer to actual walking time. Set aside enough time for breaks and simply enjoying the landscape.





Six family-friendly circular walks are available as options along the Trails. Being much shorter, these give you the option of walking a miniature Bear Trail. We've therefore called them **Teddy Bear** Trails.

The **Sidesteps** 'Felsengarten' and 'Arbesberg' are detours to grotesque rock formations and have GREY markings.

The Waldviertel Bear Trail

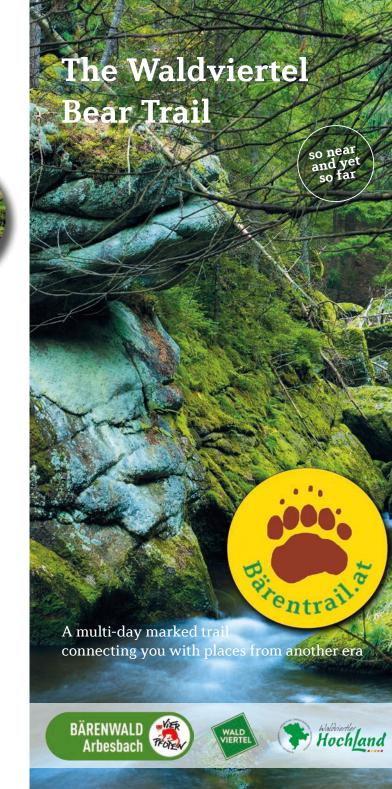

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Great Bear Trail

Total: 6 stages. 107k., 32hrs. (variants possible)

Stage 1: BÄRENWALD – Waldhofmoor – across the Upper Austrian border to Liebenau, Rubner Teich – Tannermoor – Rammelhof – Arbesbach (21k., 6.5hrs.)

Stage 2: Arbesbach – Lehrmühle – Große Kamp – Idyllic Kamp forest – Antenfeinhöfen – Klein Wetzles – Zwettl valley – Klauskapelle – Groß Gerungs (22k., 6.5hrs.)

Stage 3: Groß Gerungs – Zwettl valley – Weißmühle – Friesenhof – Wiesensfeld – Griesbach – Hammerschmiede – Kamp – Arbesbach (18k., 5hrs.)

Stage 4: Arbesbach – Kamp – Hammerschmiede – 'Sieben Sakramente' shrine – Höllfall – Hausmühle – Gorge of the Große Kamp – Paradies – Kirchbach – Rappottenstein (16k., 5hrs.)

Stage 5:

Variant 1 to Pretrobruck: Rappottenstein – Waldbad – track below Rappottenstein castle – Schütt – Wiesmühle – Lohnbach falls – Zeller Steg – Pretrobruck (12k., 3.5hrs.)

Variant 2 to Altmelon: Rappottenstein – Waldbad – track below Rappottenstein castle – Schütt – Wiesmühle – Lohnbach falls – Zeller Steg – Renngasse – Perwolfs – Luaga Lucka – Altmelon (19k., 6hrs.)

Stage 6:

Variant 1 from Pretrobruck: Pretrobruck – Roßberg – Renngasse – Perwolfs – Luaga Lucka – Altmelon – Meloner Au – Auwächter – Purrath – BÄRENWALD (19k., 6hrs.)

Variant 2 from Altmelon: Altmelon – Meloner Au – Auwächter – Purrath – BÄRENWALD Arbesbach (10k., 3hrs.)

Little Bear Trail

1 stage, 25k., 8hrs.

BÄRENWALD – Glashüttenhäuser – Rosenegg – Galgen – Arbesbach – Arbesberg – Teufelsmauer – Altmelon – Meloner Au – Auwächter – Purrath – BÄRENWALD Arbesbach

6 Teddy Bear Trails

2.9-8.5k., 1-2.5hrs.

Family friendly circular walks, the Bear Trail in miniature: Lohnbach falls, Arbesbach, Altmelon, Kirchbach, Rappottenstein and Klein Wetzles. (Klein Wetzles is possible with 'off-road' buggies).

2 Sidesteps

Felsengarten rock garden (near Hausbach/Rappottenstein): 6.5. in ca. 1.5hrs..

Arbesberg (between Arbesbach and Altmelon): 1k. in ca. 20 min.
